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## Pakistan not to host World Cup cricket in 2011

Pakistan has been stripped of hosting rights for the 2011 World Cup because of the 'uncertain security situation' in the country, the International Cricket Council (ICC) said last week. "It is a regrettable decision but our number one priority is to create certainty and deliver a safe, secure and successful event," David Morgan, ICC president, said in Dubai. "The uncertainty created by events in Pakistan created a huge question mark over our ability to do just that." The ICC will look look into possible compensation for Pakistan Cricket Board as a result of being stripped off the mega event.
